Check list for winter survival of a colony of bees in November

Varroa under control.

- a. Check average daily mite drop is less than 8 per day and ideally less than 1 per day. Too late for Apiguard now but oxalic, formic or lactic acids can be used in brood free period in December if the colony is strong enough and not weakened by viruses.

Capped stores

- a. 6 to 8 frames of capped stores in the brood box (national) which equates to 40lb stores. Feeding should be completed by early November using thick syrup (2lb sugar to 1 pint water)

Weather tight

- a. Ensure your hives are weather tight to keep out the rain and ensure the hive is kept damp free.

Reduce entrances

- a. Reducing the entrance guards against robbing and rodent attack in cold weather (you can fit mouse guards if you like).

Queen right

- a. Some colonies go queenless during the winter, these colonies are doomed and are best united to a queen right stock that is short of bees as soon as noticed.

Strong enough

- a. A good number of bees is required in the brood box to enable 35°C heat to be generated in January and February when brood rearing recommences. (minimum of 3 seams of bees in the winter cluster, 6 to 8 seams is ideal)

If you can answer yes to all of the above then you have done your bit and stand a good chance of the colony surviving the winter, but nothing is guaranteed in beekeeping. Large colonies of bees will eat more stores in the winter than a small colony.
